

About Us

Registration

International Needs Humanitarian Aid Trust (INHAT) is registered in New Zealand under the Charitable Trusts Act 1957 and the Charities Act 2005 (charity registration CC50312).

Purpose

INHAT connects partners in effective child assistance and community development programs:

Our vision to *transform lives* and *change communities*, with the inspiration and love that comes from Jesus Christ. International Needs Humanitarian Aid Trust is a Christian aid and development organisation, committed to restoring the lives of those in the poorest countries of the world. Based on its Christ centered values and over 45 years of professional expertise, International Needs New Zealand Humanitarian Aid Trust is a subsidiary of International Needs New Zealand and help empower local nationals to connect communities worldwide with love, hope and freedom.

Through the closely related organisation International Needs New Zealand, INHAT has access to International Needs Incorporated, a partnership linking Christian organisations around the world. Within that network, INHAT undertakes projects for the relief of poverty and economic distress through community development. Projects aim for social, educational, health and self-sustainability outcomes for individuals and communities alike.



Guiding principles

In carrying out its aims and purposes, INHAT operates within guiding principles:

- Inspiration, leadership and essential expertise in programmes comes from nationals
- Valid community development addresses cause rather than treating symptoms
- Beneficiaries are encouraged to participate and contribute within their means
- Effective community development is aimed at the poor and underprivileged groups, particularly women and children to contribute significantly to wellbeing and self-reliance
- Valid partnerships promote interdependence
- Fiscal integrity (sound stewardship and proper accountability) and commitment to excellence are central to successful programmes

<u>Governance</u>

INHAT is governed by a board of trustees, usually consisting of eight persons: Peter Sara (chair), David Hughes (vice-chair), Malcolm Taylor (treasurer), Robyn Cotton, Daniel Gibbons, Sarah Markley, Geoff Warne (secretary) and Rabena Tanielu. INHAT is administered on a day to day basis by International Needs New Zealand.

During 2019 International Needs Humanitarian Aid Trust receipted the following in donations:


• More than \$1,571,040 was generously donated by New Zealanders. This contribution helped see communities changed and was used for the work INHAT does in aid and development, as


well as child support programmes, across fourteen countries around the world.


• Throughout the year over \$1,357,082 was distributed to areas of work that INHAT supports.

• INNZ deducts an operational fee from donations made to INHAT supported initiatives.

This fee equated to about 19.5% of the total funds receipted. This is used to cover administration and office expenses and to ensure INHAT maintains its high level of professionalism and accuracy.

For many people living in poverty-stricken areas of the world, even hoping for a better future is a strange concept. Being part of a global family who believe in hope and do not accept the status quo, International Needs aims to empower locals to help their own who they identify are in the greatest need.

Working directly with families in some of the poorest, most rural areas of our world, our partners believe that to make real change, it is necessary to do more than just meet immediate needs. We therefore offer solutions that will generate income, increase employment opportunities, provide clean water & sanitisation as well as enable access to affordable healthcare and education for generations to come.

Economic Empowerment



Economic empowerment provides opportunities for people to break free from the endless cycle of poverty

International Needs economic empowerment programs provide pathways for moving above the poverty line. We are specifically passionate about providing centered around gender based empowerment.

Learning marketable skills, having the opportunity to start a small business, and living free from human trafficking are all vital parts of building a safe and sustainable future. International Needs prioritizes programs to provide vulnerable women and refuges an opportunity to gain a brighter future.

Communities want to be in a stronger position, without the need to depend on others to survive. To support them in this goal, we must invest in income-generation for the most vulnerable populations and focus on improving food security and agricultural productivity. Studies have shown that agricultural productivity growth has a substantial impact on poverty reduction, especially across Africa and Asia. - INAU

INHAT aims for women and girls to be economically independent. Participating in decision making, holding positions of leadership and living free from violence. Women are disproportionately represented amongst the world's extreme poor, and research indicates that when more income is put into the hands of women, child nutrition, health and education improves.

Women could increase their income globally by up to 76% if the employment participation and wage gaps between women and men were closed

Centre for Empowerment and Enterprise Development (CEED): The vocational centre empowers girls and women with skills in Fashion Design & Garment Construction, Cosmetology, Beauty Therapy and Hospitality Management. It aims to see women empowered by skilled training to be economically and socially independent and secure enabling them to contribute to the development of society.

The Centre enrolment for 2019 was 107 girls and women

International Needs partners with local churches connected to our programs and projects operating within our partner countries to provide support refugees who are seeking a place of security and a chance to begin again. Today, over 68 million people have been forcibly displaced worldwide.

Education



Every child deserves an education

Empowering children through education is the key to a bright and productive future. Education helps individuals break out of the tap of poverty and injustice and creates opportunities to maximize their God given potential.

International Needs makes connections between people who are passionate about education, and children, students, and adults who need an education. Through education, we all make an investment to change communities for Jesus Christ. Education programs include child sponsorships, school facilities, technology tools, teacher support, and scholarships for post-secondary school students.

Problem Statistic

More than 250 million children around the world are not in school.

With your help, more than 1,700 students are being educated through the International Needs Child Assistance Program. Many more are seeking to be supported, so that they too can get a quality education and better future.





"Life was tough and we often went hungry, but things started changing when I received sponsorship through International Needs. My tuition, uniform, and books were kindly provided by my sponsor. As a result, my school performance improved, and I was determined to use this opportunity to change my destiny and that of my family.

Thank God, I have achieved my goal! I now have a Bachelor's Degree in Education. I owe this achievement to my sponsors, to my aunt Sarah who gave me a shoulder to cry on, and to my mother who stood by me through thick and thin."

Our aim, is that every child is able to realise and claim their rights around education and protection from all forms of abuse. These underpin our belief that every child has the right to a quality education, as it's a key tool in breaking the cycle of poverty.


Just one extra year of schooling increases an individual's earnings by up to 10%, and up to 20% for girls. A child whose mother can read is 50% more likely to live past the age of five – Justus Miwanda INUG.

Health & Sanitation



With the gospel in one hand and compassion in the other, International Needs works around the world to reach local people for Christ through local people.

When a person has access to basic healthcare, safe drinking water, and sanitation, everything about their life is improved.



Problem Statistic

Water related illness kills one in five children under five years of age every year.

Better health care, both preventative and curative, contributes significantly to poverty reduction. For example, child malnutrition accounts for 45% of the mortality in children under 5 years. We know that investments in health reduce disease, and reducing disease has proven positive economic effects such as increased school attendance and greater labour productivity.

INHAT is passionate about children growing into their potential, so we invest in projects like WASH (water, sanitation & Hygiene) so that children and families can live healthier lives.

More than \$80,000 was sent by New Zealanders throughout 2019 to support WASH programs in Ghana, Uganda and Nepal.

Human Rights Support



Girls and women in many countries are often viewed and treated as second class citizens. Whilst this attitude is changing in a lot of urban centres, in many rural communities, these views still persist. Many families view educating women as unnecessary and are therefore unwilling to spend money on formal education for their daughters. Often women are instead expected to begin work or marry and begin a family at a young age. As a result, many of these women have only basic levels of education. With a lack of education some are sold into slavery, some resort to prostitution and others beg, just to feed their children.

Problem Statistic

It is estimated that 2/3 of women on the planet are not educated, with 58% being illiterate.

Today, International Needs partners in Ghana, Uganda, Nepal, Bangladesh, Fiji, Cambodia, Vietnam, India and Egypt help many of the liberated girls by providing education and vocational training. Many girls are unable to return home due to local stigma, therefore attending IN vocational training and teaching centre's helps them to support themselves.

At all IN vocational training centre, women can take free training courses to learn new skills to help them make a living. The girls are also taught about human rights issues, including violence against women and about reproductive health.



Chab Dai is a legal firm fighting to abolish slavery by prosecuting suspected traffickers. Funds raised are to support and fund one lawyer and one lawyer assistant annually. Chab Dai has also formed a Cambodian Coalition with 51 national and international organisations who are also working on the frontlines to abolish slavery. Together they are raising the standard of care for victims, survivors and those at risk of being exploited. "We seek to end all forms of abuse and modern slavery globally by building a movement to empower communities, to strengthen systems, and to restore justice and wellbeing with survivors"-Chab Dai

NZ Aid Projects

In partnership with the Ministry of Foreign affairs and trade, International Needs Fiji started a new NZ Aid project, called the Solo Mums Programme

Supporting this empowerment and livelihoods programme, MFAT has agreed to cofund this project over a four-year term

The Solo mums project has captured the hearts of many New Zealanders who are encouraged that they can help make a difference to their pacific neighbours.

Each year up to 20 young mothers are enrolled in a five-month course that provides them with the life skills and ability to establish their own business or give them the confidence to seek suitable employment. Not only are they equipped with these life changing skills, the team helps to provide support to the mothers through counselling, guidance and ongoing child rearing mentoring. Whilst the mothers learn and train, their children are well looked after by the IN FIJI day care team onsite.






The Solo Mothers Programme - a socio and economic empowerment program for single mothers living in informal settlements within the greater Suva to Navua areas of Fiji.
